2. Layering:

- Prepare the Branch: Make a small wound on the underside of the stem using a sharp knife.
- Bury the Wound: Bend the wounded portion of the stem down into a shallow trench filled with a moist potting

- mix. Use a small stone or landscape pin to secure it in place.
- Wait and Separate: Cover the buried portion with soil. Roots should develop within 6-12 months. Once established, sever the new plant from the parent.

- Well-Drained Soil is Crucial: Daphne domini despises soggy roots, which can lead to root rot.
- Bright, Indirect Light: These beauties prefer dappled shade or morning sun with afternoon protection.
